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MAKE FIRE SAFETY A PRIORITY THIS WINTER

Cooking is the single largest cause of fires in homes. CFA and Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV) responded to around 900 kitchen fires across the state last year, with many the result of people leaving stovetops unattended.

A fire in your kitchen can cause extensive damage to your home, but more importantly, can cause burns and serious injuries.

ALWAYS – supervise children around the Kitchen

ALWAYS – keep your cooking area clean from grease, dust, and oil.

ALWAYS – keep a fire extinguisher and fire blanket mounted within easy reach

NEVER - leave cooking unattended. If you have to leave ensure that appliances are turned off.

NEVER – use water to put out fat or oil fires.

NEVER – carry pans of hot or burning oil or materials.

If a kitchen fire occurs and you cannot put it out safely, switch off the appliance if safe to do so, and leave the premises immediately. When in a safe location, dial 000.

DO YOU HAVE INTERCONNECTED SMOKE ALARMS?

Interconnected smoke alarms sound all alarms in the house when one is triggered, significantly increasing the chance that it will be noticed quickly, by all persons inside, including if you are asleep.

Most fatalities in house fires occur when no functional smoke alarms are fitted to the home. They are vital to your survival in a fire.

Research has shown that when a fire starts in a bedroom with the door closed, the smoke alarms in the hallway do not activate. Even with the bedroom door open, the hallway smoke alarm may not activate in time to allow people in the bedrooms to get out.

The guest speaker this month was Mark Scamell who is a former Ambulance Officer and an S.E.S volunteer with forty years of experience. He has faced so many different challenges with trying to help people when they are most vulnerable when they have been involved in an accident or drug and alcohol related circumstances. Mark stayed as an Ambulance Officer on the road until he then joined the Air and Sea Rescue Team at Traralgon. Some of the rewarding but scary rescues that they had been involved in was in 1998 there was a disastrous storm during the Sydney to Hobert Yacht Race in which a lot of crew members had to be rescued from their yachts to safety. Mark was one of the Helicopter Rescue Crew who faced the unbelievable task of saving people from the raging sea. Unfortunately six people lost their lives during the storm but if it wasn't for all the people who responded to the call for help many more would have perished.

This is just one of the rescues that stands out for Mark during his working life not only with the Air and Sea Rescue Team but also as a Ambulance Officer where he started his career. We thanked him for his service to the Community with around of applause.



One of the best and most interesting YouTube topics I have seen for a long time is by a USA company and featured is **AnglingAi.com**, manufacturers of soft plastic lure moulds. Tuck yourself in and watch how it's done by the experts, allow yourself the time to explore this factory.



Go to: Touring A BAIT-MOLD Production Facility; Angling Ai Molds on your youtube channel to see 26 minutes of the most precise mould makers you or I will ever see, many of the most advanced CNC machines that produce some of the most detailed and intricate designs you can think of. The owner explains all the processes carefully and introduces you to a dedicated team of staff that apply their skills to produce a quality product. Like it's said, "you get what you pay for" and while these moulds certainly aren't the cheapest but you are definitely getting the best money can buy. The money you save making your own soft plastic lures repeatedly will offset the original price you'll pay, in the long run you'll be well in front.

Other overseas companies offer the lures themselves as a finished item of the same or similar type, as these moulds produce, but quality of finish is often compromised, this product gives you the option of injecting your own lures, choosing your own colors, size and shapes. There are many instructional videos on line to help you with the methods of making your own, saving you making the mistakes and traps if you're new to the game. Winter is certainly the best time to stay indoors and play in your shed or mancave and ready yourself and your gear for the season approaching.

HOME ENERGY EFFICIENCY ASSESSMENTS: If you are interested in finding ways to reduce your carbon footprint AND your power bills please contact us via bragbunyip@gmail.com to let us know you would like a home energy efficiency assessment by our trained volunteers. The assessment will take about 1.5-2 hours and you will received a detailed report of ways you can cut your power consumption this winter. The cost is just \$20 (or free for BRAG members).

7 ENERGY SAVING TIPS FOR THE COOLER MONTHS: As we settle into the cooler months with shorter days, there are many things we can do around the home to keep warm and save money at the same time.

- 1) Change your Heater Setting: According to the Federal Government's Your Home sustainability guide, 40% of household energy goes into heating or cooling the average Australian home. Buying the most energy-efficient heater can account for significant electricity savings, but it isn't the only way to cut down your bills. Setting your thermostat to 20°C in winter can reduce your bills significantly, with each degree of extra heating increasing energy consumption by about 5-10%.
- 2) Hot Water Usage: 23% of the energy used in an average Australian home is used to heat water. Switching to a hot water heat pump system will save between 74-78% less energy than used by traditional hot water systems. A heat pump works on the same principle as a refrigerator, but instead of pumping heat out of the fridge to keep it cool, they pump heat into the water. Other simple way to reduce hot water is to run your washing machine with cold water, take shorter showers and install water-efficient showerheads and taps.
- **3) Sealing your home from the cold:** Gaps around doors and windows can let cold draughts into your home. Door seals offer an inexpensive and quick solution to seal out the cold air, keeping your home warm. Similarly, a Chimney Damper can also provide a simple, reusable seal, blocking cold air from entering the chimney and preventing warm air from leaving.
- **4) Putting your Ceiling Fans into Winter Mode:** Many Ceiling fans have a switch above the blades, allowing you to change between summer and winter modes. This will reverse the movement of the blades that will force the warm air trapped at the top of the ceiling to fall into the room.
- **5) Reduce the hours of your Pool Pump:** While we are spending less time outdoors, changing the settings on your pool pump can make a collective difference in your electricity bills during the cooler months. When the weather cools, running your pump between 4- 6 hours per day will be sufficient to filter your pool and circulate all of the chemicals during the cooler months. This will cut the pool running times by 2 hours a day compared to summer.

6) Setting Appliances to run at off-peak times: Many appliances have timers where you can set them to run at off-peak times, maximising your energy usage when it costs you less. Typically, off-peak falls is between 9pm and 3pm for most power suppliers. Running your pool pump or doing your washing/dish washing either early in the day or late in the evening can significantly slash your bills. Note that you can only benefit from off-peak rates if you are eligible, depending on your electricity provider and the electricity meter you have.

7) Monitor your energy usage: One of the best ways to reduce your power bills in the cooler months is to track your energy usage. The emerald EMS app enables you to track your usage from your mobile with energy usage stats and weekly reports. You can also set an energy budget and receive alerts when your usage is peaking. With extra data insights, you can take control of your electricity usage, save money and keep your home comfortable in the cooler months.

Cardinia MYLI Library has Home Energy and Water Efficiency kits you can borrow which include an energy monitor so you can try before you buy!!

LET'S BRAG ABOUT COLUMBA CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL

Let's BRAG is a new monthly feature which highlights the great work undertaken to reduce our carbon footprint by local community groups, individuals or businesses.

At Columba Catholic Primary School small, simple actions can together make a big difference. They have implemented a range of different initiatives such as:



Council recycling program is implemented at the school where paper and cardboard are sorted and collected to be reused.



Planting native gardens to increase biodiversity around the school. The school is hoping this will make homes for little creatures such as lizards, bugs and birds.

Recycling hub has been created where students, families and the public can drop off items which may otherwise end up in landfill. This includes mobile phones, e-waste, pens/markers etc. oral care items, x-rays, printer cartridges, batteries, and eyeglasses. A tub is located at the front of the school for the public to drop off items for our students to sort.



Compost bins are in each classroom to promote composting food waste, leaves from trees, sawdust from the guinea pigs and chook poo. This compost is then used in the school gardens to improve soil quality and reduce waste going to landfill.



Other than the benefits already stated, the school found these initiatives had a big impact on increasing student and family awareness around how a few small actions can add up to make a big difference. BRAG is proud of the efforts Columba Catholic Primary School has made to improve the overall impact to our environment and community. Well done!
