## **About Forgotten Australians**

The people who identify as Forgotten Australians (Wards of the State) are generally now 40 years of age and upwards. They are the survivors of the approximately 500,000 children who were in institutional or other out-of-home care in the last century.

#### Abandonment and loss of family

All these children suffered from deep and lasting feelings of abandonment. The loss of family, often including separation from siblings, caused grief, feelings of isolation, guilt, self-blame and confusion about their identity.

#### Neglect and exploitation

The Senate report also revealed a history of neglect and cruelty by institutional staff and management, of abandonment and exploitation that have left at least half a million Australians, as well as many Former Child Migrants, physically and psychologically scarred. Physical deprivation was common. Children were cold and hungry. Hard physical work was part of their daily lives. Particularly demeaning and very difficult tasks were given as punishments.

#### Brutality

Punishments for very small offences or perceived disobedience could be harsh and cruel – severe physical attacks and beatings are reported by many. Alternatively, children were locked in a cupboard or a cell in solitary confinement or made to stand for many hours in one position. Bedwetting was punished with beatings, cold showers and humiliations, e.g. parading naked past others.

#### Redress

Redress for Historical Institutional Abuse is for people who experienced physical, emotional or psychological abuse and neglect as children in various institutional settings in Victoria before 1990 as Wards of the State.

#### Support

There are several support and advocacy groups for care leavers/Forgotten Australians.

Open Place: provides a range of support services to all Victorian Forgotten Australians who, as children, were placed in care *prior to 1990* regardless of where they currently reside in Australia. Services available include counselling, support to access records and assistance in connecting with family members, social and support groups and co-ordinated support to access health and other community services.

Applications opened on 10 December 2024 and are expected to be open for 18 months. Redress will be managed by the Department of Families, Fairness and Housing.

If you apply and are found eligible, you will be offered:

 a payment of up to \$20,000, a personal acknowledgement or apology, up to 20 counselling sessions.

## TALKIN' ... FISHIN' ..... PIER AND JETTY

Pier or jetty fishing gives you the chance to fish water that is generally deeper than you can cast into or fish from the shore line, it gives you a clean and solid structure to stand and supports wheelchair access as well, is safe for families, carry all your gear and setup for the day, chairs, bait bucket, lunch and esky's giving yourself a clean and comfortable spot that you just can't get on the beach or rocky shore.

If you are taking the smaller family members with you they'll enjoy the experience more, but please make sure they wear a life jacket or at least a buoyancy vest, safety first always. The height from the water can alter greatly according to the tide fluctuation in the rise and fall volume of water or the actual construction of the structure you're standing on also keeps you dry and clear of any wave action. Surprisingly rough and windy conditions can be the most productive days as the baitfish shelter below the pier and around its pylons this is where the predator fish know to look for them. Challenges are going to be actually netting your fish and lifting it up to the platform, this will require a different kind of landing net. Rather than the traditional handle type, these are rather like a crab or yabbie net that's suspended by a long rope to the water surface, guide the fish into the hoop then haul it up. Other specially designed equipment is available for pier fishing like rod holders, seat buckets, lights etc. Usually you will have other Anglers fishing in close proximity to you, try using a high-vis line with a clear leader of 5 or 6 mtrs to the baits, that way everyone can see where your line is and will help others avoid casting over your line and reduce the inevitable tangles. A weighted rig will go to the bottom, naturally, but also creates a greater angle to yourself and rod. Sinkers and hooks flying about on a pier can be very dangerous and cause some serious injuries, so be aware who's around you and look behind first before casting. Using a float set up at the appropriate depth is a great way of showing an indication of a fish biting and again everyone can see where you are fishing also using a high-vis line.

Fish regulations size and bag limits are usually displayed on an engraved plaque nearby, so familiarize yourself or get an up to date fisheries hand book with all the information you need, check you're fishing licence requirements are compliant for the whole family. Some of the older piers have gaps or cracks between their boards, some wide enough to drop a line in and pull a fish through, thin bodied trevally are a great species for this type of fishing but 'Crack fisherman' are a special breed of angler!

Before we had afternoon tea we presented Peter with amount that we had raised for Angel Flight through the day which was \$1,800 which was an amazing effort for our Club. Peter thanked everyone on behalf of Angel Flight for the day. They then thanked everybody who had helped in anyway.

Our outing this month was to the Yakult Factory in Dandenong for a guided tour of how they produce Yakult which is a healthy Probiotic. On Thursday, we left the park in two groups, the first group went to Orange World, which is a 50acre working citrus property offering education and informative tours around the picturesque property of avocado, citrus varieties and tree grafting areas. We had a ride on the tractor train with Mario, who entertained us with his stand-up jokes (he was a character!). We then swapped around and visited Varapoolia Estate which grow seven different varieties of Olives. We also tasted their awardwinning olives along with a lot of products that contain olive oil. There was a Mafia Boss, Miss Sunraysia, Sunflowers and all kinds of fruit such as Grapes, oranges, along with orange pickers. Well done everyone. ## **Gippsland Line Upgrade set for completion**

Gippsland communities can look forward to better train services, with the <u>Gippsland Line Up-</u><u>grade</u> set for completion after a major construction blitz this winter and new services to follow.

The Victorian Budget 2025/26 includes funding to deliver services every 40 minutes along the Traralgon Line, which will be made possible by the completion of the project.

The project is delivering a new train control system, updating the line's infrastructure to ensure trains can safely run more often, and more reliably.

Due to Gippsland Line Upgrade works, as well as Victoria's Big Build works impacting the metropolitan section of the network, coaches will replace trains on the Traralgon and Bairnsdale lines for part or all of the journey from **Saturday 14 June until Wednesday 13 August**.

Works to complete and commission the line's new signalling system and complete the Gippsland Line Upgrade will take place during this time.

Crews will carry out signalling construction along the line, including cabling and installing trackside signalling equipment between Drouin and Traralgon needed to complete the new signalling system which will enable more frequent services on the line.

Works will also include safety testing of new infrastructure along the 70km stretch of rail line, driver training, and the complex commissioning work needed to bring the new system into operation and enable trains to use the new platforms at Morwell and Traralgon stations and safely operate more often.

This is part of the Victorian and Australian governments' investment in the Gippsland Line Upgrade, which has upgraded stations, duplicated track to make services more reliable, delivered a new bridge over the Avon River in Stratford and enabled modern and accessible VLocity trains to travel to Bairnsdale.

The Department of Transport and Planning is developing a new timetable for the Gippsland Line, with further information on timing for the new services to come.
